Reading academic writing can be helpful because I can memorize words that I don't know and I can see that how the words are used in the sentences.\*

Logically well-organized writings are easy to read and get the point. Since I'm not a professional writer, as a learner, reading other professional writings – such as English newspaper articles – would be good. Also, writing something in English everyday would be helpful. Because it is very different when you're just reading and thinking, or when you're actually writing something.
